New Scholarship Grant Opportunities from the Educational Foundation

The NC DKG Educational Foundation is awarding two \$2,500 Marilyn F. Grinwis Gray Scholarship Grants this fall. These new awards are being made for spring semester 2019 from an endowment through Theta Chapter. Scholarships are available for degree work in Music Education or Elementary Education. Applicants may be enrolled in Baccalaureate, Master's, or Doctoral study in either of these areas of education. Applications are open to everyone. The proposal form is available on the Educational Foundation website (www.ncdkgef.org). Proposals are due **November 20, 2018**, so apply now! Awards will be made by December 5, 2018, in time for spring semester.

International Constitution and Standing Rules Amended at Convention

After much lively discussion for and against changing the name of the Society, the name will remain The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. Other proposed amendments, however, did pass at the International Convention July 16-20 in Austin. Among the proposed amendments that passed is to change the name of the state organizations to geographic locations and omit the Greek name references. The proposal retained that states shall name the chapters. Although amendments take effect immediately upon passing at the convention, the name change will be gradual as the International Constitution Committee works through all the changes this month. Another change is to allow education majors to become collegiate members of DKG. The new addition to the membership section outlines qualifications and dues. Dr. Gwen Simmons is the recipient of the 2018 International Achievement Award. She received the recognition for her service to the Society during the Impacting Education Worldwide Luncheon at the 2018 International Convention. Carolyn Pittman, 2016-2018 international President, presented the award. Simmons, International parliamentarian for two biennia. She is a North Carolina past state organization president and editor and has been recognized as a Woman of Distinction.

At the international level she has presented numerous workshops, keynote addresses, and inspirational moments, and is an author for Society publications. She has been member and/or chair of the Membership Committee, the Constitution Committee, Constitution Revision Committee, the Constitution Interpretation Committee, Focus 2000, the International Executive Board, and the Administrative Board. Simmons, described as a risk taker, motivator, communicator, and visionary, conceived and organized the state organization editors and webmasters camp.
