Update on International Conference Coming to Asheville in June

1. Workshop Proposal forms are due January 15, 2019. Share your expertise and make NC sparkle by having lots of presenters from NC! The proposal form is an easyto-submit online form on the Events page of DKG.org

2. Conference Vendors

Thank you for all you do daily to make schools a safe place where all students feel accepted and free to take some risks without fear of failure.

One last note regarding growth opportunities; I do plan to submit some of my artwork from the show to the <u>DKG Fine Arts Gallery</u>. It's not too late for you to enter as well.
