
Member Travel Spotlight

Sandra Marr appreciates a great many wonderful things in this world. She and husband JR are great adventurers! I am thrilled to have Sandra share with us some of her favorite memories of their recent Christmas trip to Zurich. Thank you for sharing Sandra! What drew us there was the famous Christmas markets. The largest market is in the three level train station, where the

can follow old brick streets, which lead to other smaller neighborhood markets. These markets sell, scents, candles, all manner of handmade textiles, paper art, Christmas decorations, cheeses, meats, candies, cookies, fancy breads, handmade jewelry etc. Yes, I brought home a few trinkets. During the day we visited two very large churches named Fraumunster and Grossmunster which played a large role in the Reformation. Martin Luther and Ulrich Zwingli were both active in bringing about the Protestant Reformation and Zurich was an active center. Several other churches, such as St. Peter's Reform Church and The Protestant Church were involved as well. We were at the Zurich Opera House which had a large Christmas Market in front, including an

serious about afternoon hot chocolate/tea and their sweets. Every afternoon people flock to the Tea Rooms for "out of this world chocolate delicacies"-- including us. You know, like the old saying "when in Rome, do as the Romans do" well we did. (We) Had a wonderful trip and would recommend it to anyone."



Love, we say it everyday, often multiple times. We click 's on Facebook pages-without a second thought. But what are we really saying? The word love has become so trivialized it seems to have lost it's impact. With Valentines Day on our minds this week, I felt led to reflect on the four letter word. In researching the topic, I identified several different types of love.

I am reminded of this passage from 1 Corinthians 13:4-5 that is often heard in wedding vows: "Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs." The focus in my message to you this month will explore the four ancient Greek words for love that are identified in the Bible and in Psychology.

- Eros- passionate, sensual or sexual form of love, and is the type most akin to our modern construct of romantic love....alas, our traditional Valentine version with Cupid depicted as a blindfolded child. Many are often preoccupied with romantic love, so much so that they risk overlooking other types of love that are more stable and fulfilling.
- Philia- is a hallmark of friendship, or shared goodwill. Some call this brotherly love. Aristotle believed that a person can bear goodwill to another for one of three reasons: "that he is useful; that he is pleasant; and, above all, that he is good."
- Storge-familial love, pertaining to the love between parents and their children. Having a natural or instinctual affection.
- Agape-*Agape* is universal love, such as the love for strangers, nature, or God. Also called charity by Christian thinkers, *agape* shows unselfish concern for the welfare of others.

As I continue to work to be a better me in 2019, I am constantly in prayer for help from the Father to be the best daughter, wife, teacher, sister, and friend that I can be that day. I depend on God to guide me one day at a time. As I approach each day, I need the Lord to help me see past my own comfortable boundaries and to help me show love and kindness to everyone-my students, colleagues, parents, the broken-hearted, down-trodden, impoverished, addicted, and mentally—ill. When we talk about loving as Jesus loved, we are talking about Agape love. It extends beyond just our emotions, feeling or sentiments. Agape love is pure and is the highest form of love. It is active, demonstrating love through actions. It is so much easier to stay in my safe little happy place than it is to take action.

So I leave you and myself with a challenge.
